Federal Priorities

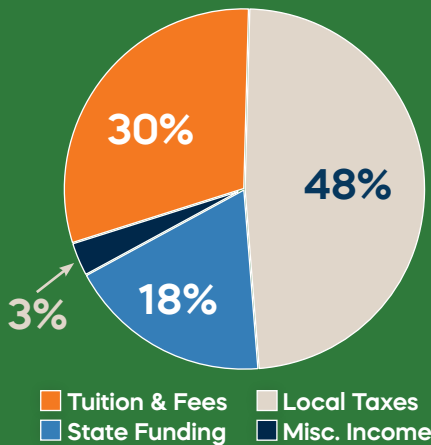
- Support for Pell Grants for Short-Term Workforce Programs:**
 Expand Pell Grant eligibility to shorter-term programs, with rigorous quality standards. Current eligibility is limited to programs 16 weeks or longer, excluding many essential workforce training opportunities. Lowering the threshold to 150 clock hours would improve access and expand the skilled workforce. (Examples: Certified Nurse Aide, Patient Care Tech, Pharmacy Tech, Truck Driving, etc.)
- Make Pell Grants Tax-free:**
 Eliminate taxes on Pell Grants to ensure low-income students can fully benefit from financial aid for both tuition and living expenses.
- No Risk Sharing on Pell Grant Participation:**
 Ensure colleges are not held liable for any form of risk sharing, such as student loan defaults. Risk sharing negatively impacts colleges that have the fewest resources and serve the most financially-vulnerable students. Risk sharing will not achieve improved student or institutional outcomes.
- Support for High Impact Grants:**
 Continue investment in grants that support student success by boosting retention, graduation, and workforce readiness (Examples: TRIO, Perkins, Title V, etc.).


